

## Grade One

Dear Grade One Families,

The school year is in full swing now with everyone settling into the class routines. One routine that is extremely important is the need for a good night's sleep. Children ages 6-11 need about 9-11 hours of sleep each night. On weekends, try not to neglect school night routines. Try to avoid electronics before bed and in the bedroom.

We are continuing to build literacy skills. Through whole group instruction, small group instruction and individual practice, we are building reading, writing, and spelling skills.

In Math, we have been learning about sorting, patterns, and number sense. We are counting forward and backward, and focusing on 5 and 10 as important bench mark numbers. We also use math starters, and the calendar daily for learning about number sense.

In Science, we are learning about the Scientific Method and in Social Studies, we are exploring ways of exchanging goods and services.

The home reading program has now begun. Check your child's backpack for their

reading books and information for parents.

Please read with your child each night for about 15 minutes. A tracking log is included to record the name of the book, the reading level of the book, and if it's a "good fit" reading level (not too hard or too easy). Reading "good fit" books is very important for students to progress as readers. Children need to spend the majority of their independent reading time engaged in books they can decode themselves.

## Grade Two

October has been such a fun and busy month in Grade 2! One of our highlights was our trip to Charlotte Lake Farms for the pumpkin patch — the students had a wonderful time exploring, learning, and enjoying the fall weather. We also celebrated Thanksgiving with a special class dinner, and it was so nice to see families come together to share in the day. Another special experience this month was our Culture Camp at the school. We made bannock, created fish scale art, tasted smoked fish, and listened to Mr. Piche's stories — a wonderful way to learn from our community and connect with Dene culture.

In Language Arts, we've been learning the difference between narrative stories and informational texts, noticing how authors organize their ideas to teach or to tell a story. In Social Studies, students have been exploring Canada's physical regions and are now beginning to compare Alberta's natural resources with those found in other regions across the country. In Science, we've been studying bodies of water, looking at local and provincial examples, and learning how small creeks flow into larger rivers and eventually reach the ocean.

In Math, we wrapped up our work with numbers to 100 and have started practicing addition strategies. We've also been exploring geometry, describing and sorting 2D and 3D shapes by their attributes. In Art, the classroom looks festive with all our pumpkin and Halloween creations. It's been a wonderful month of learning, creativity, and community connection!

## **Grade Four**

## **November 2025 Newsletter update**

In **Math**, students have been busy exploring the world of numbers! They've learned about place value, skip counting up to the tens, and reviewed multiplication from 5x5 up to 10x10. Telling time using an analog clock has also been a fun challenge! Currently, they are diving into the statistical unit, focusing on interpreting data and charts. Additionally, students will continue their journey with addition and subtraction of decimals and fractions up to the hundredths place.

In **English/Language Arts (ELA)**, our students are sharpening their writing skills through the study of Text Forms and Structures. By identifying and applying various text forms, they enhance their understanding of content, literary style, and the rich tapestry of language traditions. We are also reviewing essential elements of grammar, parts of speech, and punctuation. Each week, students engage in writing a 5-sentence journal entry, allowing them to express their thoughts creatively. Looking ahead, they will explore Cultural Texts while utilizing the Empowering Writers Narrative Writing Guide to further develop their storytelling abilities.

In **Social Studies**, we are currently immersed in our unit on Time and Exploration. Students are learning about early expansionism and exploration, as well as First Nations–European Relations and Treaties. In commemoration of Orange Shirt Day, we've dedicated time to understanding the impact of Indian Residential Schools. Next, we will delve into Colonial Conflicts and Transfers, examining the Treaty of Utrecht (1713) and the Treaty of Paris (1763), along with significant Acts and Legislation such as the Royal Proclamation (1763) and the Quebec Act (1774).

In **Science**, we are nearing the end of our fascinating Space unit, where students have been uncovering the wonders of Earth's solar system and constellations. As we look forward to our next adventure, the unit on Matter will help students deepen their understanding of the physical world by investigating matter and energy.

Lastly, in **Art**, students have been using their creativity to create stunning pencil compositions inspired by natural objects and forms. In November, we will transition into our Painting unit, where students will learn essential brush and painting techniques using both oil and watercolour paints. We can't wait to see their artistic expressions come to life!

## **Grade Five**

#### Grade 5 At a Glance

### Social Studies - Physical Geography of Canada

Students are learning about the Interior Plains region of Canada and exploring its unique landforms, climate, and natural resources. Through maps and visuals, they are identifying how geography affects the way people live, work, and use the land. This unit helps students develop their understanding of Canada's diverse physical regions and how geography shapes our identity and environment.

### Math – Multiplication Mastery

In math, students are working on multiplication strategies to strengthen their number sense and problem-solving skills. They are learning to use arrays, repeated addition, and place value to solve multi-digit multiplication problems. These foundational skills support future work in division, fractions, and real-world problem solving.

#### Science - Matter

Our current science unit focuses on Matter, its states, properties, and changes. Students are exploring how matter can be solid, liquid, or gas, and they are inves-

tigating how heat and cold can cause matter to change form. Through hands-on experiments and discussions, students are learning key scientific concepts and vocabulary to describe the physical world around them.

## Language Arts – Descriptive Writing

In Language Arts, students are developing their descriptive writing skills. Using a picture prompt, they will describe what they see using adjectives, nouns, and verbs. Students are learning how strong word choice and vivid details make their writing come alive. They will also create lists of the nouns, verbs, and adjectives they use to build a rich vocabulary bank for future writing tasks.

## Grade Six

#### **November Newsletter**

In ELA, students have been working in the vocabulary and conventions unit; learning new words and suffixes, parts of speech, compound and complex sentences. In the new unit, students are listening and speaking using the form of foundation for literacy development and improve communication, collaboration, and respectful mutual understanding. At the end of every week, there is a vocabulary quiz. Students take words home at the beginning of the week to help prepare themselves for the quiz.

In Social Studies, students are learning about Formal and Informal civic participation within the Citizenship unit. Students also had a chance to cast a ballot and vote on a set policy that they wanted changed.

In Science, students are learning about the Living Systems unit. Students are learning about Technological Advancements that help ecosystems like time-lapse photography, drones and radio tracking collars. Students are also working on creating a code for a robot camera that can explore an ecosystem.

In Math, students have been working in the Geometry and patterns/algebra unit. In geometry, students have been working on translations and understanding the basics of the cartesian plane. Algebra students are learning about expressions; creating, and evaluating using the order of operations. Students will move on to analyzing and solving equations.

Reminders: Please ensure students are dressed appropriately as the weather is getting cooler. Jackets, toque, and mitts are essential to keeping students warm on cooler days. Water bottles need to be brought in from home as well as headphones/ear buds are still needed for technology usage.

## Grade Seven/Eight

The month of October flew by fast!! Students completed three quick units in Math on divisibility rules, area of triangles and perimeters, and adding/subtracting integers. We will be circling back to these topics when we dive further into other numeracy ideas. In Language Arts, students have been reading a novel study, The Outsiders and attending LLI groups. Students will be working on improving their spelling skills and writing deeper, more meaningful responses to their reading to show their understanding and comprehension. We are aiming to write full essays by the end of the year. For Halloween, students were given an assignment that taught them about adjectives and how to use them to create descriptive writing pieces. Their goal was to try and sell a haunted house! I am looking forward to reading their final pieces of work.

In Social Studies, students completed their projects and will keep exploring the ways Canada became a colony and then a nation. First starting with the invasion, fur trade, colonization and treaty rights. In Science, students are wrapping up their first unit on planet earth. Students have completed a research project on a dinosaur of their choice. We will then be moving into Plants, Food and Fibre and learning about how sustainable food sources are important in the world and how it affects the human body.

November should be a fun month full of learning. We will also have Spirit North guests in phys ed and some health presentations on personal hygiene.

Please make sure your child has an indoor and outdoor pair of shoes. With the colder weather, muddy and snowy shoes will damage the brand new renovations in our school. Please help us keep the school looking brand new.
